- To perform a news broadcast from the scene of the Great Fire of London.
- Phonics focus on segmenting and blending sounds to read words.

Physical Education

Homework

As part of their creative curriculum, we have chosen a number of tasks linked to the children's topic. Search the web with an adult to find images of different cities in the world.

Create a scrapbook of your favourite cities and include pictures, labels and captions.

Spot and talk about different types of vehicles while you are out and about with your family.

Make a mini book of your city visit, showing the transport and buildings you saw. Label the pictures.

Make your own cityscape artwork.

Create and label a picture or map of a fantasy city. What type of buildings would be in your city and what would they look like? What transport would people use in this city?

Create a 2D city shape picture. Can you label the shape names? What are the properties of the shapes in your picture?

Take your favourite toy on a visit to a city near you. Write a simple diary about your toy's day out, including what he or she saw and felt.

Draw a map of a city and direct a toy car using words such as forwards, backwards, straight ahead, left, right, up, down, under and over. You can use numbers too.

Reading at home

- We aim to change your child's book as soon as their previous book has been returned with an adults signature.
- Home school link books need to be brought into school everyday.
- We recommend that you read for a minimum of 10 minutes daily.

- practise counting to 100 forwards and backwards.
