

Creative Curriculum Theme - Beat Band Boogie!

Music

- Appreciating different different forms of music from around the world and from different time periods.
- Explaining what they like and dislike about a piece of music.
- Experimenting with and identifying tuned and untuned instruments.
- Describing and discussing the basic elements of music.
- Using their bodies to imitate musical elements —pulse, beat and rhythm

Art

- Looking at the artist Pablo Picasso
- Recreating some pieces of art work around musical instruments

English

- Develop persuasive language to have an effect on the reader.
- Use rhetorical questions to engage the reader.
- Use apostrophes to recognise possession.
- Apply a suffixes –ment, -ness, -ful, -less and –ly to root words.

- Use commas in lists.

Maths

- Count up in 2's, 3's, 4's, 5's and 10's
- Solve multiplication and division problems, using a range of materials and methods.
- Develop the use of models to support multiplication and division questions.
