English

- Our new topic is Superheroes. If you have a copy of Supertato by Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet ask a grown up to read the book to you. If not, you can find a copy here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=rze89HB9u8g
- Create a character profile for Supertato. What special powers does he have? What is his personality like? Use your sounds to help you write words that can be blended, remember we can't sound out tricky words. Don't forget to put finger spaces in between your words.

Reception

- Can you think of a news headline for the incidents that took place in the supermarket? What punctuation might you use? Talk about question marks and exclamation marks with your grown ups.
- Create a wanted poster for Evil Pea. Can you think of some words to describe him to help the police catch him!
- If you were a superhero, what powers would you like to have? What would you do with these powers?

Phonics and Reading

- Use your Oxford Owl login to read a book.
- See how many digraphs you can remember. Can you spot them in words around the house? Maybe on food, wrappers or packaging?
- Practise your letter formation. If you have a tablet, you could try using purple mash 2handwrite to have go at forming your graphemes with lead ins.
- Create a tricky word racetrack on a large piece of paper. It should be a track that is broken into squares, each one with a tricky word on. With anther person, take turns to role a dice and jump that number of squares on the track. Whatever you land on say the word. The winner is the player who gets to the finish first.

Creative

- Can you think of any real life superheroes? (e.g. Doctors, nurses, emergency services etc.) How do the help you? Write a letter thanking them for all they do.
- Create your own 'super veggie'. What is it's name? What powers does it have? You could draw, paint or even use a real vegetable (if you have one spare!)
- Find out the names for different fruit and vegetables in another language.
- Create an outdoor game in which a Supertato character has to capture runaway peas.



 Draw or print pictures of vegetables you would find in a supermarket. Use numbers 1-20 to write a price next to them (e.g. 2p). You could use pennies or counters to play shops.

Use a 100 square (you can find one on Purple mash or top marks) to explore number patterns. What do you notice? Have a go at making your own number line from 0-20. can you use it to find out one less or one more?

Find 6 of your favourite toy figures. Stand them up and put them in order from shortest to tallest. Maybe you could use a ruler to measure how tall it is.



Remember to check Purple Mash for 2Do activities set by your teacher.
