- Make your own magic box like 'Pandora's Box'. Make a list of adjectives to describe your box.
- Write poem about a magic box using lots of different adjectives—try adding a simile or metaphor.
- Write a story that starts in your garden: consider who are your main characters? Where do they go next? Why do they go there? What goes wrong? Who helps? Where last? How do your characters feel? Aim for at least a page.







- Choose one of you favourite books and draw a new front cover for it; remember to think about what the story is about and try to make it as enticing as possible.
- Ask your parent/carer to read a page of your book, then have a go at reading the same page even better than they did! Remember to pause for punctuation.





Creative - Street Detectives

- Thank you Heroes card—choose a local hero
 from your community e.g. doctor, nurse,
 postman/woman, bin man/woman. Design a
 Thank you card for them and write a personal
 message. Try to send the card to them or leave
 it somewhere for them to see.
- Create your ideal community and draw a map of it—you might want to use a key to show what symbols mean.
- Draw a map of your garden. Draw compass arrows in the corner of your map and describe where some things are in your garden using: North, South, East or West.
- Put a blindfold on someone in your house and direct them to a room or item in the house using the directions turn: North, South, East or West. Then swap roles and see if you can follow their instructions.

<u>Maths</u>

- Use times tables facts to write multiplication and division number sentences e.g. use the number 4, 5 and 15. So $3 \times 5 = 15$ and $5 \times 3 = 15$. $15 \div 3 = 5$ and $15 \div 5 = 3$
- Write your own word problems using multiplication and division and ask a member of the family to answer them e.g. If I had 4 bags of sweets and each bag had 10 sweets in. How many sweets do I have in total?
- Get a bag of sweets, counters, pebbles or marbles. Can you find 1/2 of the amount? What about 1/4? 2/4?

- Use the kitchen scales to measure the mass of ingredients accurately. You can measure out the ingredients for dinner or to bake a cake.
