
LO: to say which group has more and fewer

- Challenge: with groups with similar numbers e.g. 6 and 7 objects, ask your child to count how many in each group before labelling





































LO: to say if groups have more, fewer or an equal amount




- Recap more and fewer from yesterday

- Challenge: ask your child to set up groups for you to count and compare









LO: to count how many altogether












LO: to partition numbers to 5




<u>Maths</u>


